“Religion without Science is Blind — Albert Einstein

A sixty-four thousand dollar question on “So You Want to Be a Millionaire” a few years ago was, “Who first said, ‘Religion without science is blind?’” Was it Galilei Galileo, Sir Isaac Newton, Albert Einstein or Clarence Darrow? It could have been Galileo, who claimed that the earth rotated around the sun, and not what the Bible said (from the story of Joshua and the sun standing still in the sky). It could have been Newton, who believed that God set the world into motion, and established the law of gravity. It could have been Clarence Darrow, who defended John Scopes, who denied special creation as outlined in the first chapters of Genesis, in the “monkey trial” about evolution in the 1920s. But it was really Albert Einstein, whose theory of relativity created a whole new way of looking at reality as a set of relationships. Two hundred years ago, many people believed that religion was a set of superstitious beliefs that would soon be proved wrong by scientific method and that religion would go out of existence in a few years. Freud even suggested that religion was pathological, just as Marx felt that it was an opiate for the masses. John Dewey and others saw belief in God as just a projection of the need for a father image.

Andrew Newberg, M. D., in an address at the ReDiscovering Cosmos Conference at Syracuse University in 1997, claimed that mainstream religion is certainly in existence and stronger than ever in our society. He pointed at the development of quantum mechanics which gives us a new way of looking at God which is compatible with modern scientific theory; at the renewed interest in ethics and moral values; at the modern studies on the relationship between



health and religious belief; at the widespread involvement in spiritual practices; and at the almost universal agreement about some of the core elements in world religions.



More recently, Malcolm Gladwell spoke about his newest book, Blink: The Power of Thinking Without Thinking, at a talk in Cambridge, Massachusetts on February 7, 2005. The book deals with what researchers call “adaptive unconscious”, the brain’s ability to make decisions before the person is aware of what’s going on. “A good deal of our thinking takes place like this,” he said, snapping his fingers. “This is a central part of what it is to be a human being.” His work encloses current research efforts in religion-and-health. Some, like Joshua Greene at Princeton University, said “Understanding why we think the way we think might help us change the way we think,” at the recent “Neurobiology of Human Values” conference in Paris. Echoing Greene’s viewpoint, Gladwell claimed that biases act as powerful filters when it comes to these situations.” Gladwell’s previous book, The Tipping Point: How Little Things Can Make a Big Difference, explored the phenomenon of sudden cultural changes and infectious ideas. “Maybe we don’t have to change the hearts of the decision-makers. Maybe we can change the context in which the decision is made.” Perhaps we all need to consider the importance of the Christian community as the context within which we make our decisions.


The Troop has already made progress on documenting previous Scoutmasters and Eagle Scouts and is in the process of organizing each of the Troop Charters going back to 1925.

Free Introductory Square Dances


From the Rockland Rockytops


Mission Yearbooks will be available for pick-up at the Presbytery Office or at the November meeting of Presbytery.
