

New Year's Greetings

Blessings to you all this new calendar year. I hope you are settling back into a routine (but not a rut!) after the Christmas holidays. Did you make any New Years' resolutions? More to the point, have you broken any of them yet?

I don't make resolutions at the New Year. For me, it's absolutely a set-up for failure. Many days I can't remember where I put my car keys, let alone what good and healthy things I'm supposed to be doing! But the Good News, the Gospel, in fact, is that for Christians, every day is a New Beginning. We get to start over every day.

One spiritual practice that helps us to remember this is the discipline of examining our consciences every evening before we go to bed. It is helpful, as we put ourselves in the presence of God to pray, to ask ourselves, "When did I feel most alive today? When did I feel closest to God?" After prayerfully considering these questions and lifting the conversation up to God, we ask, "When did I feel least alive today? When did I feel farthest away from God?" Considering and answering these questions in the presence of God is a useful way both to give thanks to God for all of God's goodness to us, as well as ask for God's help and healing in repairing those areas of our lives where we know we fall short of God's glory. It also keeps us from wallowing around in guilt that paralyzes us, so we can't change. Saint Francis DeSales, sixteenth-century Catholic Reformer, says this about our tendency to beat ourselves up, spiritually.



For my own part, if I had formed a strong resolution not to yield to the sin of vanity, for example, and yet had seriously fallen into it, I would not reprove my heart after this manner: "Art thou not wretched and abominable, thou that after so many resolutions hast suffered thyself to be thus carried away by vanity? Die with shame; lift up no more thine eyes to heaven, blind, impudent traitor that thou art, a rebel to thy God!" I would correct it reasonably and by the way of compassion: "Alas, my poor heart, behold we are fallen into the pit we had so firmly resolved to avoid! Well, let us rise again and quit it forever. Let us call upon God's mercy, and hope that it will assist us to be more constant for the time to come. Let us enter again into the path of humility. Let us be of good heart; let us from this day be more upon our guard. God will help us, we shall do better."

(From *Introduction to the Devout Life*)

Practicing a gentle, every-day-is-a-new-beginning sort of spirituality has outward benefits, as well. Not only will we be more gentle with ourselves, we will become more loving with others, remember that any and every day can be a new beginning for those whose lives are without the love of God. May Jesus Christ be Praised this day, and every day!

Per Capita: What is it? Why Should Our Church Pay it?

Our church is a member congregation of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and thus has a relationship with every other Presbyterian Church in the denomination, as well as the governing bodies: Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly. The name Presbyterian is from the Greek "Presbyter," which refers to an Elder or Overseer in the church.

Each church is a member of a Presbytery and sends two representatives—one minister and one Elder—to Presbytery meetings. These representatives have a voice and vote in the business of the Presbytery. Presbyteries are groups of churches, Synods are groups of Presbyteries and the General Assembly is the national group of Synods.

Our Per Capita funds are split into three parts and used by the Hudson River Presbytery, the Synod of the Northeast, and General Assembly to pay their operational costs and the costs of their ongoing programs. Presbytery has expenses similar to our own church—salaries, rent, utilities, office expenses and mission.

Some of the work that our Presbytery does includes nurturing members preparing for ordination as ministers, guiding churches as they go through the mission study and pastor search process, providing advice on financial matters and hearing and deciding disciplinary or remedial cases. The Presbytery sponsors Christian Education workshops and retreats, organizes Youth Ministry conferences and opportunities, advocates for rural and migrant farm workers and offers camps and retreat and conference facilities at Holmes and Stony Point.

Our church will be paying Per Capita this year in the amount of \$20 per active church member, a total of about \$2,000. Please consider including an additional gift of \$20 for each active member of your family in the collection. Use the blue envelope in your box or mark your check "Per Capita."

Rockland Tax Aide Seeks Volunteers

Low and middle-income taxpayers of all ages are eligible to receive free federal and state income tax preparation assistance including free electronic filing. Local AARP Tax-Aide volunteers provide this service in 15 libraries and other locations in Rockland County.

The Rockland Tax Aide program seeks volunteers in two areas: Tax counselors and Greeters. Tax counselors are volunteers who have an interest in tax preparation and who would like to complete income tax returns for others. They receive training in January and must pass an IRS test. They serve at least four hours per week between February and April.

Greeters help set a friendly tone and handle the sign-in sheet at tax preparation sites, help taxpayers sort through income tax documents and facilitate an orderly flow of taxpayers. No tax expertise is required. Greeters also volunteer at least four hours per week.

AARP Tax-Aide is the nation's largest free volunteer-run tax counseling and preparation service offered to all middle and low income taxpayers, with special attention to those aged 60 and older. The deadline for applications to be received at the Synod Office is April 1.




