What I Did on My Summer Vacation

I'm writing this on the plane back from Dublin, with all sorts of images running through my mind—lots of green; lots of rain; some days of glorious sunshine. I expected that the highlights of our trip would be seeing the sites associated with one of Ireland's patron saints, Saint Patrick. While I did see several of these, they were dwarfed by my experience at Newgrange.


Newgrange is a prehistoric passage tomb, built long before even the Celts arrived in Ireland, about 3500 BCE (Before the Common Era). It is a very large mound with a cave constructed deep inside, in which the cremated remains of folk in the community were interred. It is believed that the builders worshipped a sun god, and this event of Solstice, the sunrise on the shortest day of the year, was the point at which the sun god blessed the earth with fertility and new life, as well as the victory of light over darkness, and life over death.

Newgrange is a site that proves the ancients had an impressive knowledge of astronomy: at dawn on the Winter Solstice, a beam of sunlight enters this tomb through a "roof box" in the top of the doorway and slowly illumines the burial chamber. Our guide demonstrated this by turning out the lights and shining his flashlight toward the opening. It was the first time I had ever thought about what it might have been like for Jesus as he was raised from the dead, and it was an incredibly moving experience for me.

FROM THE PASTOR

The desire for a benevolent Deity is as old as humankind itself. As Christians, we claim that this Deity has become one of us in Jesus the Christ. Such a claim must never make us arrogant about our "superior knowledge," as many Victorian visitors to Newgrange no doubt felt: "Well, we're better off than the ancient pagans were, we know Jesus." God's self-revelation in Jesus is, in Paul's words, "treasure in earthen vessels."

While we stand in a long line of humanity who seek a benevolent deity, we have the treasure of the Good News that God has come to us, a good and loving God, in Christ.



The ancients built monuments such as Newgrange to honor their deities. Our God requires our lives as a living monument to God's grace in Jesus Christ. May the Sun of Righteousness continue to rise in our individual lives, and in our life as a congregation.

Monday Night Discussion Group



The very successful, always enlightening, sometimes scrappy Monday Night Discussion Group will start again September 17 at 8 PM in the Colonial Room. We will begin the year with a 4 to 6 week (depending on how fast we move) discussion of *The Apostles' Creed*. This ancient faith statement is foundational for Christian Theology. Is it a relic, a tradition we keep in the liturgy for old times' sake only? Does it speak to us today about who God is and what that means for us?

After *The Apostles' Creed*, we will discuss *Christ the Lord*, by Anne Rice. Ms. Rice is the author of the "Interview with the Vampire" series of books.

After many years away from the Church, she rediscovered her Roman Catholic Christian faith and has dedicated her writing to God. *Christ the Lord* is a well-researched, fictional account of Jesus' childhood (about which the Bible is silent). This novel is very readable and exceptionally reverent, and should provide a basis for good conversation. It is widely available in public libraries, and is out in paperback at bookstores as well.

We welcome all who are interested in good, lively, holy conversation to join us on Monday nights. As an added incentive, there are often snacks available!


