The Blessings of Great Leadership



The Presbyterian Church has always understood leadership to be a shared responsibility. Here at New Hempstead, we are blessed with a Session and a Board of Deacons who are dedicated to their tasks and their ordination vows.

So, what are the responsibilities of these two leadership boards? The Book of Order defines the duties of Elders this way:

Elders should be persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Their manner of life should be a demonstration of the Christian gospel, both within the church and in the world. It is the duty of elders, individually and jointly, to strengthen and nurture the faith and life of the congregation committed to their charge. Together with the pastor, they should encourage the people in the worship and service of God, equip and renew them for their tasks within the church and for their mission in the world, visit and comfort and care for the people, with special attention to the poor, the sick, the lonely, and those who are oppressed. They should inform the pastor and session of those persons and structures which may need special attention. They should assist in worship. They should cultivate their ability to teach the Bible and may be authorized to supply places which are without the regular ministry of the Word and Sacrament. In specific circumstances and with proper instruction, specific elders may be authorized by the presbytery to administer the Lord's Supper. Those duties which all Christians are bound to perform by the law of love are especially incumbent upon elders because of their calling to office and are to be fulfilled by them as official responsibilities.

Our Session are hard-working men and women, led by our Clerk of Session, Sue Rentz, who work prayerfully to fulfill these duties. But they do not work alone! Each Elder chairs a committee of members of the congregation so that involvement in the ministry of our congregation has as much input as possible.

Now to our Board of Deacons. The Book of Order defines the office of Deacon thus:

The office of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness and service after the example of Jesus Christ. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, of exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, warm sympathies, and sound judgment should be chosen for this office. It is the duty of deacons, first of all, to minister to those who are in need, to the sick, to the friendless, and to any who may be in distress both within and beyond the community of faith. They shall assume such other duties as may be delegated to them from time to time by the session, such as leading the people in worship through prayers of intercession, reading the Scriptures, presenting the gifts of the people and assisting with the Lord's Supper.

Our Board of Deacons, or Diaconate, work very hard fulfilling this call. In addition to sympathy, witness and service, they have also undertaken a refurbishment of the Colonial room and would welcome any and all to help as they complete this task.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Responds to Shooting

PDA is sending members of the PDA National Response Team (NRT) to DeKalb, Illinois, at the request of Executive Presbyter John Rickard of the Blackhawk Presbytery. NRT members are going to assist the presbytery and churches in the DeKalb area in their response to the shooting at Northern Illinois University.

The NRT members, the Reverend Laurie Kraus, Helen Robinson and Rick Turner, have advanced training and experience in responding to traumatic situations. They will offer support to church leadership in this response.

Please keep the injured, the loved ones of those killed and injured and the residents of the DeKalb community in your prayers, as well as the PDA volunteers and other caregivers.

Our Endeavor to "Preserve and Serve"

The Capital Campaign of 1998 was very effective, and the funds raised from that program have gone a long way toward making improvements to our church facilities. Does anyone remember the crater in the driveway by the church door, or that the church building was nothing but peeling paint, or that the windows in Murchison Hall were single pane and terribly drafty? These were all good projects that the campaign of 1998 took care of. Sadly, the funds from that campaign have now been spent.

There are new projects that are now worthy of our attention. Things like the kitchenette, office and choir robe room need to be remodeled. There is asbestos in the church basement that needs to be remediated. The barn needs to be painted. Murchison Hall needs its kitchen and bathrooms remodeled and modernized. We need more parking in the parking lot on Sunday mornings. The bathrooms in the manse need to be remodeled. And the roof on the manse will need to be replaced soon.

Your Session has given its approved for a new capital campaign, one that we are calling *Our Endeavor to Preserve and Serve*. A committee has been formed and Church Financial Campaign Services has been retained to help us with the program. CFCS is an arm of the Presbyterian Church USA and is based in



Louisville. A campaign consultant has been assigned to our church; he has already met with our committee and we have started the groundwork.

A lot of preparation will be going into this program and many of you will be called upon to assist with one of the many committees. Please respond in the affirmative when asked to serve. The commitment will be short-term and nearly all of the work will be done by the middle of



May. For the program to be successful, many hands are required, but many hands make short work and you will find the experience a rewarding one.

Be sure to reserve May 3 and 4 on your calendar for the church. On Saturday evening, there will be an all-church dinner, and during Sunday morning worship there will be a special "Preserve and Serve" program.

Over the coming weeks more details will be forth coming. Stay tuned!

Bylaws Amended

The following amendments to the By Laws of New Hempstead Presbyterian Church concerning the composition of the Session and the Board of Deacons were proposed and approved at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation of New Hempstead Presbyterian Church held February 10, 2008.

Original Session:

There shall be nine (9) elders, divided into three (3) classes of 3 each. One class shall be elected each year at the annual meeting of the Congregation or any other special meeting called only for this purpose for a three-year term.

Proposed and Approved Amendment:

There shall be no less than nine (9) and no more than twelve (12) elders, divided into three (3) classes of no less than 3 and no more than 4 each. One class shall be elected each year at the annual meeting of the Congregation or any other special meeting called only for this purpose for a three-year term.

Original Board of Deacons:

There shall be nine (9) deacons, divided into three (3) classes of three (3) each. One class shall be elected each year at the annual meeting of the Congregation or any other special meeting called for this purpose for a term of three years.

Proposed and Approved Amendment:


There shall be no less than nine (9) and no more than twelve (12) deacons, divided into three (3) classes of no less than 3 and no more than 4 each. One class shall be elected each year at the annual meeting of the Congregation or any other special meeting called for this purpose for a term of three years.
