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On Prayer

The following quote was recently used in the newsletter of First Presbyterian Church, in Savannah Ga., where I grew up. It really got me thinking.

We believe prayer is something we should do, even something we want to do, but it seems like a chasm stands between us and actually praying. We experience the agony of prayerlessness. We are not quite sure what holds us back. Of course, we are busy with work and family obligations, but that is only a smoke screen. Our busyness seldom keeps us from eating or sleeping or making love. No, there is something deeper, more profound keeping us in check.... But for now, there is one “something” that needs our immediate attention. It is the notion—almost universal among us high achievers—that we have to get everything “just right” in order to pray.

This quote, from Richard Foster, *Prayer*, reminds us that not only do we not have to get everything “just right” before we pray, we will never (this side of God’s reign) have everything right to begin with! God isn’t concerned with how we look, or even what mood we are in before we come to God in prayer. God just wants us—who we are at the moment. I once heard a story about an interviewer who had two separate meetings with God. At the end of the first interview, she asked if there was anything God would like to say to God’s people. God said, “Tell my people I love them.”

A few months later, the reporter went back for a second interview with God. Before leaving, she again asked if there was anything God would have her tell God’s people. God’s answer? “Tell my people I miss them.”

Could it be that God misses us when we don’t spend time with God? Henri Nouwen said, “What is prayer but simply being with Jesus, wasting time with him?” In Christ, God longs to be our companion through this journey of life. The goal of prayer is not to get God to do our bidding, the goal is to “waste some time” with God that we may become more like Jesus, who prayed for God’s will to be done.

Often, prayer does have some results. Fanny Crosby, the blind hymn writer, once welcomed a young composer into her home. The woman was playing a tune on the organ, and turned to see Crosby kneeling in prayer. She played her tune a second, then a third time. At that point, Crosby rose from her knees and began dictating verses to go with the music. The result was the hymn, “Blessed Assurance, Jesus is Mine.”

May we all make time in our days to place ourselves in the presence of God in prayer. Perhaps God misses us when we’re away.

Break the Bread of New Creation

Then they told what had happened on the road to Emmaus, and how Jesus had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread. While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

(Luke 24:35-36)

"Break the bread of new creation Where the world is still in pain."

The first time the risen Christ broke bread, according to the Gospel of Luke, was in Emmaus with two of his followers. Brokenhearted, the



two did not recognize him as they walked together from Jerusalem to Emmaus and talked about their master's death on a cross three days earlier. Here, in the words of the hymn "Christ Is Risen! Shout

Hosanna!" was a place "where the world is still in pain." The two followers did not know him until he blessed the bread, broke it and gave it to them. He then disappeared, but the joy and peace he gave them did not. Though it was late, they retraced their steps the seven miles to Jerusalem, where they found the disciples and shared their good news of seeing him alive. As they tried to make sense of the latest developments, Christ appeared to them and offered his blessing: "Peace be with you."

Christ continues to reveal himself and offer us his peace whenever and wherever bread is broken and eaten in his name. Just as he offered bread and peace to those broken by the forces of hatred and destruction, we, Christ's people, are to carry the reality of peace to the places and people in pain.

Please keep in mind that 50% of this offering is given to the entire Presbyterian Denomination for distribution, 25% is given to the Hudson River Presbytery for their designated Peace mission and 25% remains for NHPC to allocate. The mission committee will be meeting to determine where our portion will be used.

In accordance with the action of the 217th General Assembly, congregations are being asked to consider directing a portion or all of their 25 percent of the Peacemaking Offering as a faithful Christian response to the HIV/AIDS pandemic.

Sunday, October 5, New Hempstead Presbyterian Church will be receiving and dedicating the Peacemaking Offering. We ask that you pray about this and join the congregation in giving generously toward Peace on this day.

Ten Excuses Not to Donate Blood

1. "I'm afraid to give blood."

Most people are the first time, but if you just take the time (and courage) to make one donation, you'll wonder why you ever hesitated. There's really nothing to it!

2. "Other people must be giving enough blood."

You can gamble your life on that assumption, but please don't gamble other people's lives. What a tragic and useless waste it would be if someone died because people did not care enough to donate blood - if they left it for someone else to do.

3. "My blood isn't the right type."

Every type is the "right" type. Both rare and common blood types are needed all the time.

4. "They wouldn't want my blood because of the illness I've had."

If you have doubts, the staff in the donor center will answer your concern.

5. "I don't have any blood to spare."

If you are reasonably healthy, you have 10 to 12 pints in your body. You should be able to give one pint regularly every 56 days (up to 6 times a year) without any problems.

6. "My blood isn't rich enough."

Everyone who donates undergoes a mini-physical exam that includes a hemoglobin test for anemia. If you are deferred because of low hemoglobin levels, most people donate another time without any problem.

7. "I'm afraid of being turned down."

If you are medically deferred, that's okay. At least you tried. It may only be a temporary deferral, so try again later. The need for blood will never run out.

8. "They'll take too much and I'll feel weak."

The amount taken is less than one pint. Besides, your body makes new blood constantly. In fact, the volume you give will be replaced within 24 hours. Most people just continue their usual activities after donating.

9. "I didn't realize my blood was needed."

It certainly is. Good Samaritan had transfused more than 4000 units of packed cells last year. To meet the transfusion needs of our patients, 35-40 units of blood are required daily.

10. "I'm too busy."

Positively the poorest excuse ever invented. You can make the time, if you really want to. The entire process takes a little more than an hour. A little of your time will save LIVES.
