God in New Mexico, Or Why I'm Glad My Parents Read the Bible to Me

As you know by now, Howard and I really enjoyed our twenty-fifth anniversary trip out to New Mexico. The mixing of Spanish, Mexican and Indigenous peoples cultures made for a mosaic I won't soon forget.

As many of you also know, I attribute my love of scripture to the fact that my mother and father read the Bible to me from a very young age. Whenever I travel, I am often reminded of stories from Scripture, or Bible verses. Our vacation in New Mexico put me in mind of many of the treasures of our Scripture. I offer a few to you now, like a necklace of turquoise beads.

- The desert is, well—desert. When we crossed the Rio Grande, it looked rather like a trickle, not the Mighty Hudson I'm used to. But I was put in mind of God's promise to Israel in Isaiah 35: 6b. "For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert."
- The Sangre de Cristo ("Blood of Christ") mountains near Santa Fe are spectacular. I could spend an entire day watching them as the light changes, turning them different colors. Yet as entrancing as they are, they cannot preserve us. Psalm 121:1 reminds us: "Even if I lift up my eyes to the hills, from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth."
- Even in mid-September, the sun is still very strong. If Saint Paul had known about skin cancer, I'm sure he would



have included sunscreen in his metaphor of the whole armor of God, Ephesians 6: 13-17.

- We walked so much that my feet were sore. (You can probably guess what scripture popped into my head!) Nahum 1: 15: "Look! On the mountains the feet of one who brings good tidings, who proclaims peace."
- We certainly had peace proclaimed to us in the form of the hospitality of the people we met. Especially in Taos Pueblo, where the Indians welcomed us into their own homes and shared their stories with us. Scripture is filled with stories of hospitality and the importance of sharing it. While we were not the angels, I felt often that we were hosted by them, thus, (by some inverting!) Hebrews 13: 2—"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers for by doing that some have entertained angels without even knowing it."

I encourage you to think throughout your day—what stories of God and God's people are you reminded of?

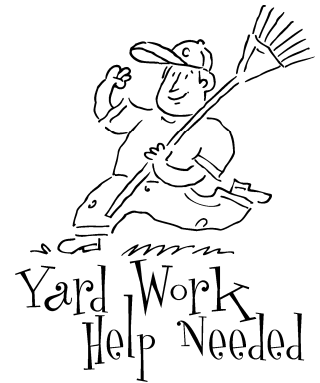

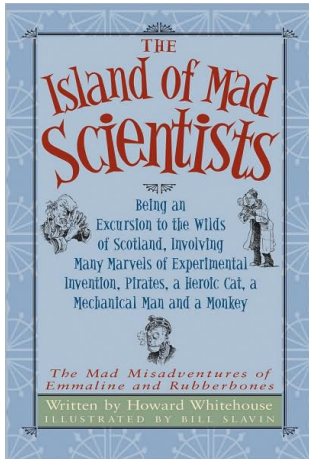

 Whether near or far!

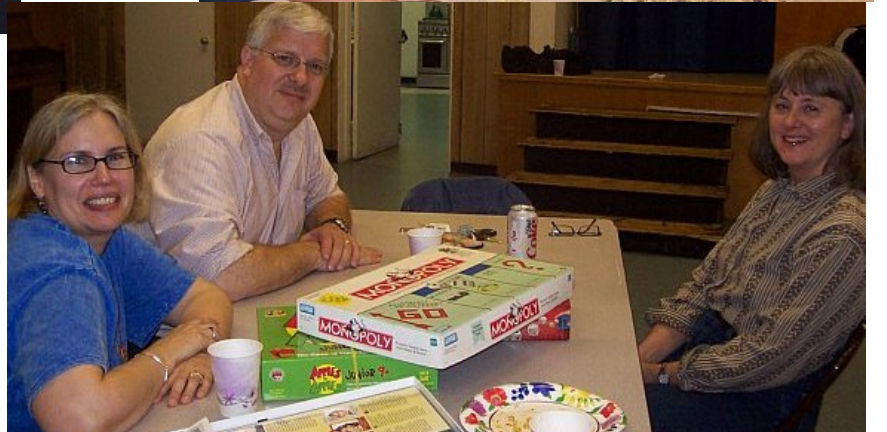
He is our Heavenly Father!








When Paul sent a letter to the church at Philippi, he told his friends how he felt about them. Finish this puzzle to read what Paul wrote in Philippians 1:3.
