



A Walk through Stonecrop Gardens

On May 17, a stalwart group of nine set out from the church to visit the public garden at Stonecrop, which is near Cold Spring. As we made the 40-minute drive to the site, there was plenty of time to chat and to appreciate the beautiful scenery of the Hudson River Valley.

We could not have had a better day to visit the garden – not too hot, not too cold, a slight breeze and plenty of sunshine. Our tour guide, Julie, led us through the different areas of Stonecrop, which included alpine, woodland, and native plant gardens. She was very knowledgeable about the plantings, answered our questions, and gave us plenty of time to explore each area. The diversity of plants was fascinating, and the springtime flowers were beautiful. The gardens also had several man-made ponds, which were home to turtles, bullfrogs, salamanders, and snakes (!).

When we finished the tour, we assembled at an outdoor patio seating area for lunch. As we sat in the sunshine, we shared conversation and food. It was so relaxing to just sit, listen to the birds, and watch the high clouds roll by. After lunch, half of the group decided to visit the plant sale area, but the other half opted for a visit to an ice cream parlor in Cold Spring. The trip to Stonecrop Gardens was a wonderful experience, and it may be worth revisiting in the late summer to see different blooming plants.
