




Summer Reads!


So here, for the last time, is a list of several of my favorite books from last year. In no particular order:

Tell Me a Story, by Cassandra King Conroy. A memoir by the wife of Southern novelist Pat Conroy, who died in 2016, written by his wife. She writes lively tales of Conroy's friendships, and the enemies he was able to make friends out of. As he himself wrote, "My wound is geography. It is also my anchorage, my port of call." 
Pat. I know the feeling.



The Depth of Wells, by Maren Tirabassi. Tirabassi is a United Church of Christ pastor in New Hampshire. Her poetry deeply moves me. "Sylvia in the Writing Class" recounts the story of an elderly woman "who sleeps in her living room/by the pretty lights/of the Christmas Tree." So poignant.




The Day the World Came to Town, by Jim deFede. Mark Z. recommended this one to me. It tells of the town of Gander, Newfoundland, on 9/11. They took in planes that were unable to land, put the passengers up in their homes, and generally behaved like Beloved Community on a hideously bad day.





Things Hidden: Scripture as Spirituality, by Richard Rohr. I'm still reading this one, along with the guidebook that goes with it. As much as I love studying the Bible, I am enjoying reading it from a different perspective, that of a plain, garden-variety Christian with no classes to teach or sermons to write!

Any of Nancy Atherton's Aunt Dimity novels. These are probably way too sweet and wholesome for hard-core, must-read-the-latest-thriller readers. They feature a lead character (named Lori!) who is an American living and raising her family in the Cotswolds, in England. A very idealized portrait of village life, and a wonderful escape to a world where the worst problems are along the lines of how to incorporate a homeless man into the community. (I also love that the Church is the cornerstone of the village, so perhaps it falls into the category of fantasy...)



Glory to God. This hymnal is the Purple Pew Edition, Presbyterian version, and we are hopeful to find a number of new favorites to go along with our old favorites from the previous hymnal, which are in the new one.

If you are interested in having a copy of this hymnal at your home, you can get a digital version from Kindle (which has an app on IPhone and IPad, so you don't have to own a Kindle device). It's only \$10! Here's a link to that: Glory to God (Purple Pew Edition, Presbyterian). They also sell the Hardcover version.

There are app versions in the iPad App store and the Android version can be found in the Google Play store. The free version only includes the Public Domain Hymns, so be aware that you would have to buy the Pew edition to get all of the Hymns (\$20!).

[Hymnals for home use or a large print version (without music) is available through the PCUSA website. In addition, iPad users can obtain multiple versions through the Apple store including bassoon and tuba transpositions as well as the pew edition.]

I am writing this letter of gratitude on the day after Pentecost, the season in which we celebrate the birth of the Church and witness the extraordinary acts of the Holy Spirit, who rested on each of the faithful disciples, and through them, spoke in many languages to those who were thirsty for good news, so that each who listened-no matter where they were from, what language they spoke, and who they were-received the gift of the gospel and the promise of

the transforming love of Jesus.
