

For some, Easter is all about God's victory over death. It was for me when I was a child. My beliefs went something like this: Before Jesus, when we died there was nothing. Now because of Jesus, when we die, we have eternal life. This may or may not be true (I certainly hope so). But for me, at least now in my life, it does not matter. It once comforted me but now I find it too limiting. Is this really all there was to Jesus, Emmanuel, God-With-Us?

Over the years I have come to believe that it is Jesus' life that matters most or at the very least as much as his death and resurrection. Now, I believe that as Christians, it is our call to live THIS life here on earth following the way of Christ. If resurrection means anything it means that the life of radical love, Jesus embodied; the vision for humanity he lived and died for, remains alive and well and I, 2000 years later, can choose to be a part of Resurrection Living. We can be Resurrection People.

and people from the community. It is wise to wear work clothes and to bring work gloves. We will provide you with a reflective safety vest, trash grabbers, and garbage bags. All you have to do is



pick up the trash with the grabber and put it into a bag. Easy.

And if you happen to find KiRBy the Knome, you'll win a fabulous prize. This is an opportunity to give back to our community. We anticipate a sunny, dry day and about 60 degrees, perfect weather for an outdoor activity. Water and granola bars will be provided.
