By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.

- Luke 1:78-79

I have a mantra I repeat to myself whenever I am feeling anxious or unsure about the future. The 14th century mystic Julian of Norwich wrote it. It goes like this: "All shall be well, all shall be well, all manner of things shall be well." I have it on a plaque on my wall and wear it around my wrist on a bracelet.

Like the quote from Luke, it points to the greater picture. One in which God is ultimately in control; a future where, ultimately, all things shall be well. The dawn from on high will indeed break upon us to give light to those who sit in darkness.

Some may think this is "pie in the sky" optimism, and maybe it is. But it reminds me when I am in situations over which I have no control, to trust God. This is an important reminder in a world that gives us the illusion that we have control over everything.

As we begin the new "program" year at New Hempstead, I hope we can embrace this optimism, trusting God with the life of our community of faith. This does not mean we do nothing. It means that as we embrace our ministries, we trust God in the midst of some of the unknowns. It means that we become intentional about our spiritual lives through regular attendance at worship, participation in adult education, mission activities and fellowship events. It means committing ourselves to the life of the church.

Trusting God involves more than a little bit of foolish optimism. As Christians we join the foolish believers who follow Jesus trusting that by doing so our lives and the world can be transformed. With joy let us bear witness to the Good News. We are all the beloved of God and therefore, All shall be well.

### **Visit to the Union Church**

On August 2 a dozen of us travelled to see the Union Church in Pocantico Hills and its beautiful windows. We got to sit in the pews of the church and listen to a history lesson by the docent. This is a non-denominal Protestant church built in 1915 by John D. Rockefeller and others, and sits just a short distance from the Rockefeller estate Kykuit. The original windows were clear glass but over the years the Rockefeller family commissioned stained glass ones to adorn this unassuming country church. The first was the rose window over the alter, done by Henri Matisse and completed two days before his death. It honors Abby Aldrich Rockefeller, an active member of the church and a founder of the Museum of Modern Art. The window on the rear wall, honoring John D Rockefeller Jr. and titled "The Good Samaritan" was done by Marc Chagall. The eight windows on the sides of the sanctuary were also done by Chagall. With the noon-time sun streaming through, the colors were vivid indeed. And then we went for lunch at Horsefeathers in Tarrytown. Many thanks to Nancy and her Committee for making all of the arrangements.

# As Requested, Paula Deen's Breakfast Casserole

5	Slices	Thick sliced white bread, crust and all, buttered and cubed
---	--------	---

- 1 Pound Mild sausage, cooked, crumbled and drained.
- 3 Cups Grated extra sharp Cheddar cheese.
- 4 Eggs
- 2 Cups Milk
- 1 tsp Dry mustard
- 1 tsp Salt
- 1 tsp Hot sauce

Spray a 1 ½-quart casserole dish with vegetable oil cooking spray.

Place the bread cubes in dish. Evenly distribute the sausage over the bread cubes. Sprinkle with the cheese over the sausage.

Combine the eggs, milk, mustard, salt and hot sauce and mix well.

Pour the egg mixture over the bread, sausage and cheese.

Cover and refrigerate overnight.

The next morning, allow casserole to sit for 15 minutes.

Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees for one hour.
